Shor Yoshuv Rabbinical College has signed and returned the Certification and Agreement and the assurance that the institution has used, or intends to use, no less than 50 percent of the funds received under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.

Shor Yoshuv Rabbinical College will receive or has received a total of \$29,899 from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students.

Shor Yoshuv Rabbinical College has disbursed \$29,920 to 107 students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act as of December 25, 2020, with the entire funding of Section 18004(a)(1) student grant portion and \$21 of institutional funds.

The estimated total number of students at the institution eligible to participate in programs under Section 484 in Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and thus eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act who were enrolled for the Spring 2020 semester, while funds were available is 107.

The method used by Shor Yoshuv Rabbinical College to determine which students receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants and how much they would receive is based on the expenses for food, course material, equipment needed to participate in the educational program due to the disruption of campus operations, travel home expenses and health care related expenses. Awards of \$190 was disbursed to each dependent student and a \$300 award for each independent student. An additional award was disbursed to Title IV eligible students who were enrolled during the Spring 2020 COVID lockdown with each dependent student receiving and additional award of \$70, and each independent student receiving an additional award of \$135.

Students received the following instructions with their grants: "As per the CARES Act, these grants are to be used for expenses that are related to the disruption of campus operations due to COVID-19, including things like course materials and technology as well as food, housing, health care, and childcare."
